
'Fi' is short for 'Fiona' and is pronounced 'fee'.

Chaining begins with words or syllable contexts the child can produce. This one is for children who can produce /f/ within a word (intervocalically) but not word initially. Start by familiarising the child with the words 'coffee', 'toffee', 'Daffy', 'Miffy' and 'huffy' (or similar words). Then practise saying them. Then say them with the second syllable slightly exaggerated (coffee). Move on to 'coffee-Fi', 'toffee-Fi', etc. Then move on to 'coffee-Fi-Fi', 'toffee-Fi', etc. Gradually ease into 'Fi-feel, etc. Finally introduce more words with /fi/ SIWI followed by words starting with /f/ followed by other vowels.


